

When VE Day dawns on 8th May 2020 it will be 75 years since the guns fell silent at the end of the Second World War in Europe. Years of carnage and destruction had come to an end and millions of people took to the streets and pubs to celebrate peace, mourn their loved – ones and to hope for the future, but not forgetting those still in conflict until 15th August when it was announced that Japan had surrendered unconditionally to the Allies, effectively ending World War II.

The 75th anniversary will provide our nation, and our friends around the world, with an opportunity to reflect on the enormous sacrifice, courage and determination of people from all walks of life who saw us through this dark and terrifying period. It will be an opportunity for us all to remember the enormous sacrifices that were made at home and abroad and to joyously celebrate (from inside our homes) as people did 75 years ago, the arrival of peace in Europe.

Activity 3

Design and make a VE Day medal for a Hero!

The medal below was given to soldiers who had fought in World War One. It was a symbol of great pride but its design was highly symbolic.

Your task is to create a medal for British soldiers, like Captain Tom Moore, who served in World War II that is just as symbolic and creative.

You could also design a medal for our NHS or key workers and give it to someone you think deserves it!
