I had lots of fun with **you** today.

Possessive pronouns show ownership and replace possessive noun phrases,

The guitar is **hers**.

"That parking space is **ours**!" screamed mum.

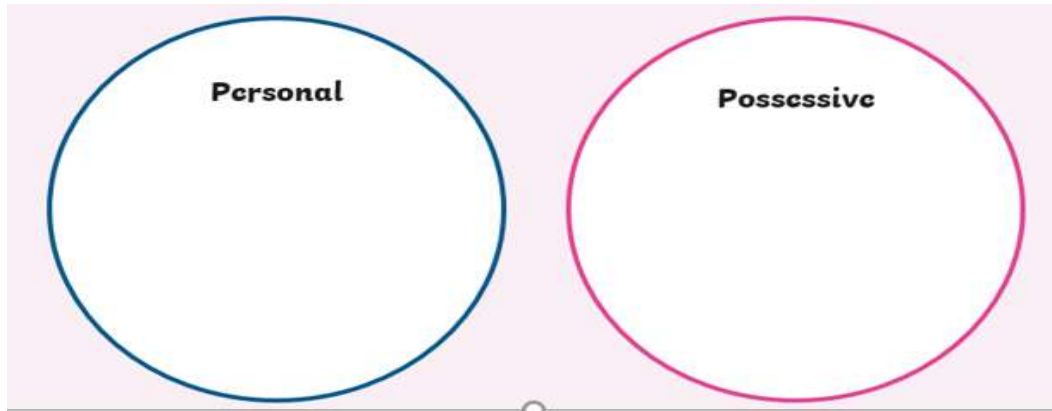
Here are some examples

she	us	ours
it	mine	theirs
	they	yours
