6. Who do you think Nanny is?

Answers

1. Who is Alexander? *A beetle.*
2. Where did the child put Alexander? *In a matchbox.*
3. How did Alexander escape? *Nanny let him out because she opened the box*
4. Summarise what the poem was about in 3 sentences.
 - *The child had a beetle in a matchbox.*
 - *Nanny opened the box so the beetle escaped.*
 - *Nanny and the child found the beetle in the garden and put it back in a matchbox.*
5. Write down 2 things that they did in the garden.
 - *Looked for holes*
 - *Went to places where beetles might be*
 - *Made noises*
 - *Looked for the beetle*
 - *Found the beetle*
6. Who do you think Nanny is?
